

Bruce W. Randolph, M.D. Class of 1980

Dr. Bruce W. Randolph, a native of Live Oak, Florida, enrolled in Tuskegee University in 1976 on an athletic scholarship for football. He lettered his freshman and sophomore years (1976-1977) and received the Outstanding Scholarship Award in 1977.

As a Biology major, Dr. Randolph excelled in the classroom, making the Honor Roll every year during his tenure at Tuskegee. He was named Who's Who in American Colleges, a member of Beta Kappa Chi National Scientific Honor Society, and a member of the Minority Biomedical Support Program. He also served as a summer intern at the National Institutes of Health, Bethesda, Md. for two consecutive summers while attending Tuskegee. In 1980, Dr. Randolph graduated Summa Cum Laude from Tuskegee. He subsequently earned his Doctor of Medicine and Masters of Public Health degrees from the University of Florida and Johns Hopkins University, respectively. Additionally, he received training in Family Medicine at the University of Arkansas, General Preventive Medicine at Johns Hopkins University, and Occupational Medicine.

Dr. Randolph is an Asst. Professor in the Department of Family and Preventive Medicine at the University of Arkansas for Medical Sciences and he is CEO of Randolph Occupational Medicine Services (ROMS). The focus of his practice is Worker's Compensation, Disability & Impairment Evaluation, Holistic Health Care, and Total Wellness. He has practiced medicine for 30 years.

Dr. Randolph is also an ordained Gospel Minister. He founded Issa Ministries, Inc., a nonprofit religious corporation which promotes holistic health and wellness through education, counseling, mentoring, and evangelism. Also, he currently serves as an Associate Pastor at Rufus K. Young Christian Church in Little Rock, Arkansas.

Dr. Randolph and his wife, Dr. Mildred (Montgomery) Randolph (Class of 1983, Veterinary Medicine) are strong and consistent supporters of Tuskegee University.
