

Herbert C. Jones Class of 1966

Herbert C. Jones, a Golden Tiger basketball-track star from 1962-1966. He played outstanding varsity basketball for four years, served as captain for three years and earned a reputation as a star on the hardwood in Logan Hall and throughout the Southern Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. As a track athlete, Jones dominated the long jump, triple jump, javelin and sprints. His dominance as a track and field athlete reached the highest levels, so much so, that his track coach dubbed him as possibly the only person in 30-40 years to reach the Century Club at Tuskegee.

Jones is currently employed as Director, Project Outreach, Office of Under Secretary, Department of Treasury. His professional life includes other positions in federal service, television and education in Washington, D.C., New Orleans, LA and Snow Hill, Alabama.

Since 1969, Jones amassed many awards and honors associated with his excellent performance as an educator, federal employee and his military career. These awards and honors include Who's Who in America, Coach of the Year, the Northeastern Region's "Alumni Achievers Award", and recognition by the National District Attorneys Association and Ebony Magazine where he was featured as the first African American to be hired in five high level positions within the government service.

Jones' community service activities with the Ron Brown Middle School "Lunch Bunch Group", which he founded, Big Brothers of America and Partnership in Education exemplified his unselfish commitment to helping others achieve. He also arranged two field trips for students at the Ron Brown Middle School and sixty computers to be donated to two other Washington, D.C. schools. An achiever himself, Herbert C. Jones, is an excellent role model.
